The importance of home language

Maintaining a child's home language is **vital** for their education and it also helps them to retain their own culture and identity as this language has been passed down from one generation to the next.

A child's home language provides a firm foundation on which they can build upon to acquire English language skills. Research proves that children with well-developed home language skills acquire additional languages more quickly. Children who do not continue to develop their home language may have trouble with their English language skills.

Please remind parents & caregivers to speak in their home language at home

In the Classroom

Oral language is the first encounter everyone has with a language. Therefore, every task, where possible should allow the EAL child to discuss their ideas using their home language or the English they have learnt so far. This will depend on where they are in their learning journey.

Bilingualism or multilingualism is something that should be celebrated

- It increases cognitive ability and allows the brain to stay alert and active.
- Knowing more than one language allows the individual to engage in more opportunities: locally and globally.
- It allows the learner to be connected to their cultural identity and gives the child a sense of belonging
